In this newsletter, we'll share what we've been up to in the third quarter, 2025, the progress, the lessons, and the exciting things ahead!

About Eco Alchemy

At Eco Alchemy, we believe in turning waste into something useful. We work with young people and communities to turn organic waste into animal feed using insects like black soldier fly larvae and crickets. Our goal is to keep the environment clean, create jobs, and help farmers spend less on animal feed.

Eco Alchemy at the Regional Show 2025

We showcased at the Regional Show 2025 under the theme "Promoting Climate Smart Agriculture and Trade Initiatives for Sustainable Growth." we showed up with something different — insects! More specifically, the Black Soldier Fly Larvae (BSFL) and the golden oil we extract from them.

The BSF oil is a natural antibiotic rich in lauric acid, a clean source of quick energy, and even a natural skin healer. Plus, nothing goes to waste — the larvae recycle organic scraps into high-value protein and oil, while their frass becomes organic fertilizer. One insect tackles waste, feed costs, food insecurity, and climate change simultaneously.

The Regional Show reminded us that local innovations, when given a platform, can spark real change.

Cricket 101 : Turning Waste to Wealth

We held a joint session with Mixa Farm to reconnect and inspire cricket farmers in Kisumu. Together, we explored how cricket farming can tackle organic waste while creating income, food, and healthier communities.

The highlight was introducing the Cricket 101 model — where one farmer works with 100 others in a cooperative way, solving market challenges and ensuring everyone benefits. Farmers left energized, ready to rear crickets smarter, reduce waste, and add more value to their produce.

Value Addition & Product Development Workshop

In partnership with the Sustainable Agriculture Foundation and MSEA, we participated in a workshop on Value Addition and Product Development as part of the Nutrition in City Ecosystems Project.

We trained youths and farmers on how to cut production costs and manage agricultural waste using black soldier fly farming and other best practices. The response was amazing, 20% of the farmers adopted the technique immediately!
